Dear Parents and Carers

I must begin my welcome to this half-term's newsletter by paying my own personal tribute to Peter Walsh, the former Headteacher of our school who sadly died in April and was buried earlier this week. The outpouring of emotion and celebration of Pete's life has been amazing, with many people feeling compelled to say how he touched their lives. On page 2 you will find a tribute to Pete, along with some memories shared by current FHS staff who knew him.

I first met Pete in 2001 whilst working as a member of the Lewisham School Improvement Team. I was bowled over by the force of his personality and the commitment he had to Forest Hill. As one colleague enthusiastically shared with me around that time, Pete was like a stick of seaside rock with 'Forest Hill School' running through his core! That was so true. Pete was an inspiration to me from that time onwards, being a role model for me to return to school as a senior leader, and to work at Forest Hill under his leadership if possible. The rest is history! I've said many times that Pete transformed the school, paving the way for it to become a true 21st Century boys' school. This was a life's work for him; he only ever worked at Forest Hill. He was determined that, before his retirement in 2008, he would leave our current magnificent building as his legacy to the community. He moved heaven and earth to realise that ambition.

Pete's passing marks the end of an era and we are all so sad. Our thoughts are with his family, who still retain strong connections with Forest Hill. In time we will announce how we will commemorate and honour Pete's lifetime commitment to the school.

As usual, there is a great deal to interest you in this newsletter. One thing I would like to highlight is the article on some things students have done to mark the anniversary of George Floyd's death this week. We have made a commitment to extend commemorative activities beyond half term and we'll be announcing these after the break. As a school we are clear that we want to signal publicly our support for all of the great work around racial equality which has come out of George's death in 2020.

I would also like to encourage parents and carers to respond to the Annual Parent Survey which will be made available from Monday 7 June 2021. The contribution of parents to the development of the school, and to the sharing of ideas about what the school does well and what it could do to improve its provision for students is very important to us.

A Tribute to Former Headteacher, Pete Walsh

On 1 September 1973, Pete Walsh joined Forest Hill School, fresh out of Teacher Training College where he had specialised in History, Geography and English, after graduating from Ulster University with a BA Hons in History. He rose through the ranks serving variously as Housemaster, Senior Housemaster and Deputy Head before being appointed as Headteacher in April 1998. He oversaw the eventual transfer from the old site to the new PFI building in December 2007/January 2008 before retiring from the school at the end of December 2008. Living just around the corner, Forest Hill School was an extension of Pete. He was an inspirational leader who transformed the school and touched the lives of many students and staff during his 35-year career here. Sadly, Pete passed away on 22 April 2021. As a community, we will find a way to celebrate and commemorate Pete's dedication to Forest Hill.

He is the reason that me and many others wanted to work at FHS and the reason why so many of his students got into teaching. People like Pete Walsh don't come along very often and I'm really grateful that I met him. Rest in Peace Walshy.



Diversity Appreciation Week

From 26 – 30 April, we celebrated our first Diversity Appreciation Week – a school-wide celebration of the rich variety of cultures and background represented here at Forest Hill School. In preparation, teachers took note of all the different nationalities within their tutor groups, which were then collated and, with the help of some extremely helpful Year 8 students, identified on a huge world map using drawing pins, colour-coded for each house (and white for staff!) and displayed in the atrium.

Additionally, quizzes and competitions were undertaken in tutor time to encourage students to appreciate the diversity of their school, borough and city. Throughout the week, Olive Dining ensured the involvement of everyone’s taste buds by serving up meals typical of some of the most commonly represented ethnicities – including Afro-Caribbean, Italian and Chinese.

On the Friday, staff and students alike were invited to come to school wearing traditional clothes or colours of their background, which created a hugely vibrant atmosphere. To do this, they were asked to donate £1, £2 or £5 to AFRIL (Action For Refugees In Lewisham) and we were delighted to raise a total of £767.86. The charity itself is massively appreciative, as is the school, for all of the students’ engagement and involvement!



Year 7 Marble Runs

Over the Easter holidays, Ms Peneda, a PGCE student currently teaching Art and Design, challenged some Year 7 students to a competition to build a marble run out of everyday materials. Each week, Year 11 students are nominated by their teachers for their hard work and the students with the most nominations are awarded a certificate.


Congratulations to Amari J, Do’yen S, Alan S and Glenn D who were named Students of the Week this half term.

Mission to Mars Challenge

Last term, the National Literacy Trust launched its Mission to Mars – a STEM reading challenge for KS2 and KS3 children, designed to test students’ knowledge of science, technology, engineering and maths with a fun quiz and the task of designing a survival home on the planet Mars. Year 7 and Year 8 students were encouraged to take up this challenge over the Easter holidays and those who wished to could enter the official competition. Jack Petchey Awards Ceremony

For some time now, Forest Hill School has participated in the Jack Petchey Foundation's flagship programme – the Jack Petchey Achievement Award Scheme. It is a reward and recognition initiative which enables schools and youth organisations to celebrate the achievements of young people and receive additional funding.

Each academic year, students are nominated for awards by teachers and their peers who feel that they have gone above and beyond to achieve, with each winner receiving a framed certificate, a pin badge, a boxed medallion and £250 to spend on a project of their choice which will benefit a group of young people.

Since the outbreak of Covid-19, the foundation has been unable to host their Achievement Award Events so on Thursday 20 May 2021, online pre-recorded digital events were privately broadcast to schools and the 2020/2021 award winners across London, which included 10 FHS students: Finn O'D in Year 9; Benjamin H, Jack W, Patrick L and Rhyheiem S in Year 10; Santiago FC in Year 11; and Alexander K, Gino J, James V-S and Luis K in Year 12. They were subsequently awarded their medals by Mr Sullivan in the school library. Congratulations, boys!

We were also delighted to see two members of FHS staff receiving Jack Petchey Foundation Young Leader Awards. Mr Theo Chambers, Drama Teacher, and Ms Victoria Richardson, Art Teacher, have been recognised for their incredible commitment to the school as voted for by the students. Congratulations to both.



Model United Nations Club

The Model United Nations Club started as an online club with students participating via TEAMS meetings but for the last three weeks, year groups have met up face to face on a Tuesday afternoon and both Year 7 and Year 8 groups have grown in size as the club has become more popular with the students.





During these sessions, students have considered the aims and role of the UN and what skills they will develop as part of the Model UN club.

Each week, they are required to bring in recent news stories that they discuss in their groups about current global events. Students then consider the problems for each event and if there are any solutions that the groups could come up with from the perspective of the country they represent. At the end of the session, students present their news story as a 'resolution' and students vote on whether or not their country will support this.

The students are really enjoying this opportunity to build skills in public speaking, research and critical thinking and we hope to reach a position where students research, plan and deliver current UN problems without teacher support.

Y11 Student Writes Borough of Culture Anthem for Lewisham

Year 11 student, Kevin B-A, plays the keyboard and writes music in his band *The Melodists*, which was formed a couple of years ago with fellow students Exauce N-M (Lead Guitar), Behrinjah G (Bass Guitar) and Godwin Z (Drums).



Inspired by bands such as The Composers and Generation Squad Entertainment, Kevin writes his own music and the band have previously performed at school as well as the Canada Water Theatre and the annual Lark in the Park festival at Mayow Park.

Music Teacher, Mr Livingstone, both a big supporter of the band and part of a Music Teachers' Group for LEAN (Lewisham Education Arts Network), was so impressed with one of Kevin's recent compositions that he suggested it for Lewisham's Borough of Culture 2022 anthem. They loved it! Lewisham primary school music teachers are now busy writing a chorus for the piece of music and Year 11 student, Tyrese J, is going to rap over it during a recording session which will take place next term.

Congratulations to Kevin and the band, and we look forward to hearing the anthem soon!



Year 7 Printmaking Club

This half term, our after-school printmaking club has provided an engaging and creative atmosphere for Year 7 students to learn some basic printmaking techniques. The students were curious and participative and were happily surprised with the result of their artworks (pictured here).

They printed images of fossils using a planographic technique called Monotype, through which new images are created on a flat surface – an ideal method for beginners as it does not require a printing press.



One of the groups learned about Collagraph, a versatile printing process in which a textured plate is inked up and put through a press. They used string, fabric, and pieces of card to create different textures from which they printed unexpected landscape collagraphs.

To introduce relief printing techniques, students printed with Styrofoam, which is a polystyrene sheet you can draw on (and imprint) with a blunt pencil to create recesses.

The ink is then applied to the surface of the Styrofoam plate, and a print is taken either by press or by hand. Having the opportunity to print several copies of the same image allowed students to experiment and play with pattern designs.



Junior Mathematical Challenge

The Junior Mathematical Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple-choice competition aimed at students across the UK. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. This year's challenge took place online on Tuesday 27 April for selected Year 7 students and Thursday 29 April for selected Year 8 students.



We are delighted to announce that 23 Bronze and 12 Silver certificates were awarded to students along with six Gold certificates! Congratulations to all boys! The six gold certificate recipients, Stanley M, Brandon P, Kaya S and Sidney D in Year 8 along with Year 7 students, Mohammed D and Remi H, have also qualified for the Kangaroo round of the competition which will take place on 15 and 16 June and we wish them all the best of luck!

Whilst they were all extremely grateful to come back to school in March, teachers have been exceptionally busy this term due to GCSE and A Levels being awarded by teacher assessment, which has meant them having to set a lot of extra assessments for Years 11 and 13. It is vital that we are being fair and accurate in our marking and giving every single student the best chance to do as well as they possibly can. 


Ms Suart Completes Fifth Moonwalk




Future of Parents' Evenings – Survey Results

Parents' Evenings are an example of one of the activities that we had to adapt during the coronavirus pandemic and, since September 2020, we have held successful virtual Parents' Evenings for every year group. In fact, feedback suggested many parents/carers found the online format very useful and convenient. But what about when we are no longer subject to Covid restrictions?

We would like to thank over 200 parents and carers who responded to our Parents' Evening survey, which asked whether they would prefer to keep Parents' Evenings as virtual events or would rather come into school to meet teachers in person. And the results were...

60% voted Virtual
35% voted Face-to-Face
5% voted No preference



Whilst many parents liked the convenience and ease of the virtual events, others felt that face-to-face meetings helped them feel connected to the school. We will take these results and all of the corresponding comments into account as we plan the school calendar for 2021/2022.
